Let us continue with the reading from Luke's gospel,

Luke 24:6-12

⁶Remember how he told you, while he was still in Galilee, ⁷that the Son of Man must be handed over to sinners, and be crucified, and on the third day rise again.' ⁸Then they [the women] remembered his words, ⁹and returning from the tomb, they told all this to the eleven and to all the rest. ¹⁰Now it was Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary the mother of James, and the other women with them who told this to the apostles. ¹¹But these words seemed to them an idle tale, and they did not believe them. ¹²But Peter got up and ran to the tomb; stooping and looking in, he saw the linen cloths by themselves; then he went home, amazed at what had happened.

Easter 2025: Idle talk...or is it?

I love wordsearches; one of my favourite games was 'Boggle' (look it up!), it had words; it was competitive; and most times I would win- what was not to like! But mostly I love how words can be arranged to tell wonderful, insightful stories or convey information. Of course they can also be used to spread disinformation too.

Words have power; they can encourage and support, they can also bring destruction. They can incite people into action, and they can create barriers. Words can be used to welcome as well as dismiss. They can be thought-provoking, playful, directing, and inspiring.

The manner in which words are expressed, and who they are being expressed by, can determine the impact that they have for good or ill. We pay more attention to certain voices because of their perceived status, though we do not always give proper heed to the words they use.

Easter and the period leading up to it known as Lent, has its own terminology – repentance, wilderness, temptation, death and resurrection, new life, hope. At this time of year these ideas (words) can be seen all around us as we move from winter to spring, with flowers and buds emerging from the seemingly bare land and branches. The longer spells of sunshine that bring a positive feel to the world around us and within us. We use these to help 'picture' and explore the deeper meanings.

And it was with words that the women, who had followed Jesus from Galilee all the way to the tomb where Jesus had been placed, tried to convince the apostles that Jesus had risen- just as Jesus had told them all as they had travelled together during his ministry. It wasn't until the women had been reminded of this that they remembered the words spoken by Jesus, preparing them for this moment.

But how do you try to explain such an incredible turn of events, the stone rolled away, the tomb itself empty with only the grave clothes present until two men in dazzling clothes gently chided them- why are you looking for the living amongst the dead?

It is perhaps unsurprising that the apostles did not believe them, calling it idle or nonsense talk. And yet, something in the words that Mary Magdalene, Joanna and Mary mother of James and others shared, seemed to resonate with Peter. He did act. He went to the tomb and stooped down and looked in, and went home, amazed. Maybe at that point not fully convinced by what the women had to say but certainly beginning to ponder.

It is remarkable that such an event would first be shared by women, a group whose voice and words could be easily dismissed- nonsense, idle talk and yet even their words had an impact- small at first but enough to convince one person to go and see for themselves. And over two thousand years later we are listening to these words for ourselves, what impact will they have on us?

In a world where we have so many words, and so many dominating voices demanding our attention it is good to recall that sometimes, the seemingly idle talk- the easily dismissed words and voices, are important too.

As we celebrate the risen Christ may we be attentive to the words that are employed around us, respond to God's prompting and direction, even when it seems a perplexing thing to do. May we be constantly amazed by God, this day and every day. Amen
